Family Services Regina (Regina, SK)

Targets' Experience of Stalking

Front line service providers hear powerful stories of how profoundly stalking has affected the lives of its targets. This research project will collect these stories to document the impact stalking has on women, in order to communicate this to others who do not fully understand how life-altering and harmful the stalking experience is to targets. In addition, this research will document the services, resources and processes that were helpful and those that were not helpful to targets, throughout the different stages of their ordeal. The research will also examine what has stopped stalkers.

Mothering, Guiding and Responding to Children: Are There Differences for Women Experiencing Intimate Partner Violence?

The research will examine if there is a difference in mothering, guiding and responding to children between women experiencing intimate partner violence and women who are not experiencing intimate partner violence.

Evaluation of the Ndinawe Child and Youth Care Certificate Program

The Ndinawe Child and Youth Care Certificate program was established in 2007 and is a full-time, Red River College accredited, community-based education and training program for individuals over the age of 18 who have previous experience in the sex trade. The program's goal is to offer these individuals the opportunity to gain experience and education in the field of child and youth care. The evaluation of the program will address the following questions:

1. How does this program meet the needs of experiential students who have exited the sex trade?
2. What is the impact of this program on students in terms of further education, employment, and relationships with their own children and families?
3. What areas of the service and program delivery contribute to student success and what areas of service and program delivery require development or improvement?
